We're all ready for Rio

Olympic dressage hopefuls have spent months preparing their horses for this summer's Games in Rio. The team at Bradford's Veterinary Physiotherapy has been at the forefront of those preparations

EAM GB's riders have spent months getting themselves and their horses in the peak of physical and mental fitness for the forthcoming Olympics in Rio. with both equine and rider, Tim strives to get each horse he treats moving well and symmetrically, to keep it supple and moving freely through the joints.

"Dressage is all about elegance and precision of movement, and the stronger, the more

flexible, the more pain-free they both are, the better they peform," he says. He plans to fly out to Rio to support the team when the Games get under way in August, when top riders Carl Hester, Charlotte Dujardin, Fiona Bigwood and Spencer Wilton take centre stage. For Tim, working with Team GB has been a long-held dream.

"It's brilliant that we now have that level of standing, that riders and owners

are putting their trust in us," he added. "To be treating one of the four best dressage horses in the country . . . well that's the ultimate achievement."
